At the 2019 business meeting, Brett Boutwell revisited the chapter's recent decision to allow proposals for presentations in alternative formats (panel presentations, lecture-recitals, film screenings, etc.). These proposals would be evaluated by the program committee in the same manner as are more traditional proposals. The chapter continues to invite proposals for such alternate presentations for future conferences.

The chapter also considered whether individuals should be allowed to submit more than one proposal for consideration in any given year. The membership unanimously supported a motion to permit only one proposal per person per year. This restriction will become part of the language for next year's call for papers.

Michael Palmese of Louisiana State University received the award for the best paper read by a student at our 2019 meeting for his presentation "The Curious Case of Anthony Gnazzo: A Lost American Experimentalist." Mr. Palmese received a \$250 award as well as hearty congratulations from our chapter. About Our New Officers and Representatives

Joseph Sargent (President-Elect) is Assistant Professor of Musicology at the University of Alabama. His critical edition of music by English Renaissance composer Nathaniel Giles is forthcoming in the British Academy's Early English Church Music series. Other studies on various Renaissance and 20th-century repertories have appeared in *Early Music History*, *The Musical Times*, *Revista de Musicología*, *American Choral Review*, *Sacred Music*, and several essay collections. Prior to joining the Alabama faculty, he earned a Ph.D. from Stanford University and taught for six years at the University of Montevallo.

Sarah Caissie Provost (Secretary-Treasurer) is an assistant professor of musicology at the University of North Florida. She has published work on swing music and dancers on film in *Music and the Moving Image* and on gender and creativity in *Jazz Perspectives*. Her essay on Mary Lou Williams is forthcoming in *Black Music Research Journal*.

Joe Gennaro (Abstracts Editor) has been a member of AMS-S since 2012 and currently is an Associate Lecturer of Music History and Literature at the University of Central Florida. In his time at UCF, he has developed the Class Piano curriculum, taught the Music History sequence, and designed several online courses in Music Appreciation as part of the Music Department's General Education offerings. He is currently working on a project entitled *Songs of Baseball: A History of the Music of Our National Pastime*.

Blake Howe (AMS Council Representative) is Associate Professor of Music at Louisiana State University. His research interests include Disability Studies, German song, and film music, and he has published on these and other topics in the *Journal of the American Musicological Society*, *The Journal of Musicology*, the *Journal of Music History Pedagogy*, and *The Musical Quarterly*. He is co-editor of the *Oxford Handbook of Music and Disability Studies* and co-author of the *Oxford Bibliography of Music and Disability*.

Katlin Harris (Student Representative to AMS Council) is a second-year master's student and graduate assistant in Musicology at Louisiana State University. Her research interests include the intersection of music and politics in the Napoleonic Era, the American wind band tradition, and the music of Franz Schubert. Katlin has recently presented at the 2018 AMS-Southern Chapter Conference, and she will be taking on the role of Student Coordinator at the 2019 SAM meeting. Prior to her graduate study, Katlin obtained a Bachelor of Music in Flute Performance with a minor in History from Methodist University (2017).
