About Our New Officers and Representatives

Blake Howe (President Elect) is Paula G. Manship Associate Professor of Musicology at Louisiana State University. His research interests include Franz Schubert, film music, and Disability Studies, and his writings on these and other topics have appeared in the *Journal of the American Musicological Society, The Journal of Musicology, Nineteenth-Century Music Review, The Musical Quarterly, Music Research Annual, and the <i>Journal of Music History Pedagogy*. He is the former co-chair of the Music and Disability Study Group of the American Musicological Society and the former recording reviews editor of *Nineteenth-Century Music Review*. With coauthor Brett Boutwell, he is currently writing a textbook based on a course created for music majors at LSU, titled *The Musician in Society* (forthcoming from W. W. Norton).

Laura Dallman (Secretary-Treasurer) is a Lecturer at the University of Florida. Her research focuses on orchestral music and performance in the 20th and 21st centuries, particularly accessibility and representation as they relate to symphonic sound and attitudes of access within symphonic institutions. Book chapters discussing the music of Jennifer Higdon have appeared in *The Routledge Handbook of Women's Work in Music* and *Twentieth- and Twenty-First-Century Song Cycles*. A chapter examining Michael Daugherty's "Las Vegas" is forthcoming with the University of Illionis Press in fall of 2023.

Maria Ryan (Abstracts Editor) is Assistant Professor of Musicology at Florida State University and a Senior Fellow in Critical Bibliography at the Rare Book School. She is currently working on a book about the relationships between race, music, and slavery in the British colonial Caribbean. In addition to her work on music and slavery, Maria researches and teaches Black feminist theory, the intellectual history of Black music, and book history and archive studies. Her work has been supported by grants and fellowships from ACLS/Mellon, American Musicological Society, American Historical Association, Society for American Music, and Library Company of Philadelphia.

Leo Walker (Student Representative to AMS Council) is a baritone, dancer, and Ph.D. student in Historical Musicology at the University of Florida. His research interests concern the production design and histories of Benjamin Britten's vocal works, specifically those containing explicit forms of gendered violence. Before coming to Florida, Leo earned a Master of Arts degree in Musicology from Western Michigan University. His thesis analyzed the musical and rhetorical content of Ted Hearne's *Consent* to qualify justifications for rape. Leo currently serves as the Vice President of UF's Student Society of Musicology. He is also a vocalist in Early Music Ensembles and a Teaching Assistant in undergraduate music and dance history surveys.
