About Our New Officers and Representatives

Blake Howe (President) is Paula G. Manship Professor of Musicology at Louisiana State University. His research interests include Franz Schubert, film music, and Disability Studies, and his writings on these and other topics have appeared in the *Journal of the American Musicological Society, The Journal of Musicology, Nineteenth-Century Music Review, The Musical Quarterly, Music Research Annual*, and the *Journal of Music History Pedagogy*. He is the former co-chair of the Music and Disability Study Group of the American Musicological Society and the former recording reviews editor of *Nineteenth-Century Music Review*. With co-author Brett Boutwell, he is currently writing a textbook based on a course created for music majors at LSU, titled *The Musician in Society* (forthcoming from W. W. Norton).

Sarah Caissie Provost (Past President) is Assistant Professor of Music History at the University of Hartford in Hartford, CT. She previously held the position of Associate Professor of Musicology at the University of North Florida. Her scholarship is primarily in the areas of early jazz and its intersections with gender, historiography, and creativity. Her work has appeared in *Jazz and Culture, Music and the Moving Image, Jazz Perspectives*, and the *Routledge Handbook of Jazz and Gender*. An upcoming piece on Paul Whiteman's and Benny Goodman's conceptualizations of jazz history will appear in the volume *Beyond the Bandstand: Paul Whiteman in American Musical Culture* (ed. W. Anthony Sheppard).

Julian Duncan (Student Representative to AMS Council) is a doctoral student in musicology at Florida State University. His research focuses on American and European military music, as well as music, sound, and conflict. His recent projects have focused on war as a driver for change in music culture, and transnational and transhistorical musical exchange. He is also interested in military music as a social institution and a form of popular music. In addition to his work as musicologist, Mr. Duncan is an active performer. He is the graduate assistant for the world music

program and the Center for Music of the Americas at FSU, and has performed in a variety of world music ensembles, including the modern popular music, Balinese gamelan, and Brazilian ensembles. He also serves as a musician in the 116th Army Band, Georgia Army National Guard, and will be participating as a collaborative pianist on a diplomatic concert tour throughout the Republic of Georgia in May 2024. At FSU, he co-founded the Dean's Student Advisory Council (DSAC) for the FSU College of Music, and serves on the College's Blue Sky Committee.
